**SUBJECT:** Implementation of the State Verification Exchange System (SVES)

Program in the Data Warehouse Business Objects

#### **PURPOSE:**

This Action Transmittal (AT) describes the SVES information (SVES report)<sup>1</sup> that will be available to IV-D staff through the Business Objects<sup>2</sup> program after the Michigan Child Support Enforcement System (MiCSES) 4.7 Release. The SVES report will provide Social Security Administration (SSA) and locate information on child support parties<sup>3</sup> as well as information regarding incarcerated individuals.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The federal Office of Child Support Enforcement (OCSE) and SSA collaborated to provide SSA data to child support agencies through the Federal Parent Locator Service (FPLS). SVES data contains information for NCPs, CPs and PFs who receive:

- Title II, Federal Old-Age, Survivors, Disability Insurance benefits; or
- Title XVI, Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits.

The SVES report will also provide information on child support parties who are incarcerated in federal, state or local prisons and jails. 4

Before SVES data was included in Business Objects, child support staff obtained SSA information by calling the local SSA office. The availability of SVES data in Business Objects will allow staff to verify SSA and prisoner information without having to call the local SSA office. Additionally, this information will:

- Aid staff in initiating income withholding orders (IWNs);<sup>5</sup>
- Provide evidence of income or a change in circumstances for review and modification of child support obligations;
- Help locate parties; and
- Aid in closing cases.

#### PROGRAM ACTIONS AND POLICY INFORMATION:

Obtaining and using SVES information will enhance IV-D staffs' ability to handle IV-D cases because it provides detailed locate, income and benefit information for the parties.

# 1. Submitting Requests to SVES

Requests for SVES information will be made in three ways:

- 1. MiCSES will automatically send the member to FPLS because (s)he is marked as "not located" on MiCSES;
- MiCSES will automatically send a Federal Case Registry (FCR) add or modification when the member's FCR record is added or changed;<sup>6</sup> and
- 3. A IV-D worker will manually request the member be sent to FPLS on the *Locate Request* (LREQ) screen.<sup>7</sup>

MiCSES will not send an automatic or manual request for FPLS unless there is a verified Social Security number (SSN) for the member.

FPLS will not return any information if Michigan or any other state has marked a case with a family violence indicator (FVI). Specifically, no information will be returned if MiCSES has sent the FCR a case that has been marked with any of the following FVI reason codes:<sup>8</sup>

- PW Michigan personal protection order (PPO) with confidential address, when the PPO contains a confidential address provision;
- FW Foreign PPO with confidential address, when the PPO contains a confidential address provision;
- SS Sworn statement:
- FP FPLS has returned a confidential address; or
- CT The court has ordered the address be protected.

# 2. Business Objects

The primary purpose of the Data Warehouse is to collect data from different sources and provide IV-D staff the ability to search for and review child support case information. IV-D staff may only view and print data from Business Objects; Business Objects will not download data into MiCSES.<sup>9</sup>

IV-D staff and MiCSES may send full child support locate requests to SVES through the FCR. SVES will return matched information to the Data Warehouse: the information will be available through Business Objects approximately one week after the locate request is made.

- 2.1 IV-D staff may search for child support case information in Business Objects using any of the following search criteria or a combination of the criteria:
  - SSN:
  - Birth month;
  - Birth day;
  - Birth year;
  - Last name:
  - First name;
  - Date range (the span of dates the response may have been received);
  - County code; and
  - Prison type (when searching for prisoner information).

Note: Each field must either have a specific criterion or "ALL" selected. 11

# Example:

An FOC worker is querying prison information and selects SSN = 1, Birth month = May, Birth day = ALL, Birth year = ALL, Last name = Smith, First name = Robert, Date range = ALL, County code = ALL and Prison type = 1 (state prison facility). The results will list all Robert Smiths, born in May, being held in a state prison.

2.2 Business Objects will return up to 10,000 rows of information for each request. If more than 10,000 rows are found, the additional rows will not show. If the query reaches the 10,000 row limit, IV-D staff must narrow their search by limiting their search criteria.

# 3. Acting on SVES Data

The SVES report is divided into four reports. <sup>12</sup> Each CP or NCP will be placed on only one of the reports. IV-D staff must review each of the four reports individually to determine whether SVES contains data on a member. For example, running a Title II search will only bring back information on the *Title II Report* and not on any other report. Once the data is returned, IV-D staff may print the report and use it for IV-D purposes.

OCSE considers the data returned on SVES to be verified. However, the data may change over time as individuals go on and off of disability and are released from or moved within the corrections system.

3.1 Title II – SSA Retirement, Survivors, Disability and Health Insurance Benefits Information (Title II Report)<sup>13</sup>

Title II benefits are retirement, survivors, disability or health insurance benefits. Members on this report include:

- Individuals who have started receiving partial benefits at the age of 62 or received their full benefits when the old-age threshold is reached (65 for persons born before 1938, 66 for persons born between 1938 and 1960, and 67 for those born after 1960);<sup>14</sup>
- Individuals who cannot work because of a medical condition that is expected to last at least one year or result in death;<sup>15</sup>

- Surviving family members of a deceased individual, including the individual's surviving wife/husband, dependent children or dependent parents;<sup>16</sup>
- Unmarried children of retired or disabled parents, including adopted children, up to age 18 or up to age 19 if they are full-time students who have not yet graduated from high school;<sup>17</sup> or
- Unmarried children over the age of 18 if they have a disability that started before age 22.<sup>18</sup>

# 3.2 SVES Title XVI – Supplemental Security Income Benefits Information (Title XVI Report)

Title XVI benefits are SSI for the aged, blind and disabled. Individuals on this report include:

- Disabled or blind children with income levels that fall within the eligibility limit for SSI:<sup>19</sup> or
- Individuals who have low income and limited resources and are:
  - Over the age of 65;
  - o Blind; or
  - o Disabled.<sup>20</sup>

# 3.3 SVES - Prisoner Information Report

Individuals on the *Prisoner Information Report* are under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Prisons and are incarcerated in federal, state or local correctional facilities.<sup>21</sup>

The Bureau of Prisons data does not provide prisoners' future release dates to SVES. IV-D staff may find a prisoner's date of release by checking:

### 3.4 SVES – Participant Not Found Report

If a party is submitted for an SVES locate request and the submitted information does not match SSA's Title II, Title XVI or prisoner data, the party will be listed on this report. The CP/NCP may be listed on this report for three reasons; the CP/NCP:

- 1. Does not receive any type of Social Security benefit;
- 2. Is not incarcerated; or
- 3. Has an FVI on his/her case and his/her address is indicated as being confidential because it has one of the reason codes listed in Section 1 of this AT.

# 4. SVES Report Formats

The following attachments contain model formats of the SVES reports and explanations of the data fields on each of the four reports:<sup>22</sup>

- Attachment 1: SVES Title II SSA Retirement, Survivors, Disability and Health Insurance Benefits Information Report,
- Attachment 2: SVES Title XVI Supplemental Security Income Benefits Information Report;
- Attachment 3: SVES Prisoner Information Report, and
- Attachment 4: SVES Participant Not Found Report.

## 5. Use of Reports

#### 5.1 IWNs on Title II Benefits

Benefits individuals receive from Title II are considered income for child support purposes and are attachable with an IWN.<sup>23</sup> FOC staff will treat Title II benefits as a new source of income and will initiate an IWN in MiCSES as follows:

1. Open the *Member Employment History* (EHIS) screen, enter "E" in the *Income Type* field and select the appropriate local SSA office identifier from

- the Other Party Cross Reference (OTHX) list to enter in the Other Party Id field:24
- 2. Mark the Insurance Available box as "No" (N). MiCSES entries coded "E" will not generate a National Medical Support Notice (NMSN) when the Insurance Available box is marked N; and
- 3. Click on the IWN Information pop-up window to finish initiating the IWN.<sup>25</sup>

Title XVI benefits are means-tested income; therefore, they must not be considered as income for determining child support and cannot be attached with an IWN. However, any other income the Title XVI recipient earns that is not means-tested may be used to determine the child support obligation and may be attached with an IWN.

#### 5.2 Review and Modification

Michigan Compiled Law (MCL) 552.517 requires FOC staff to initiate a review of a child support order when there are reasonable grounds to believe that the amount of child support awarded should be modified. Reasonable grounds to review an order include a change in financial circumstances of a CP or NCP including, but not limited to:

- Application for or receipt of public assistance; or
- Incarceration for a term of more than one year.

SSI is means-tested income and is considered "public assistance." <sup>26</sup> If FOC staff determine that an NCP or CP has been sentenced to be incarcerated for one year or more or is receiving SSI, they must initiate a child support review.<sup>27</sup>

#### 5.3 Locate

FOC staff may use the information provided through SVES to locate an individual. However, SSA addresses must be independently verified.

FOC staff may be able to close a IV-D case if a party has died or is incarcerated for life.<sup>28</sup>
